1.1 REPORT ON THE AUDIT OF FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Unqualified Opinion

I have audited the financial statements of Tanzania Extractive Industries Transparency Initiative (TEITI)-CIDA, which comprise the statement of financial position as at 30 June 2022, the statement of financial performance, the statement of changes in net assets, cash flow statement and the statement of comparison of budget and actual amounts for the year then ended, as well as the notes to the financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies.

In my opinion, the accompanying financial statements present fairly in all material respects, the financial position of Tanzania Extractive Industries Transparency Initiative (TEITI)-CIDA as at 30 June 2022, its financial performance and its cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with International Public Sector Accounting Standards (IPSAS) Accrual basis of accounting and the manner required by the Public Finance Act, Cap. 348.

Basis for Opinion

I conducted my audit in accordance with the International Standards of Supreme Audit Institutions (ISSAIs). My responsibilities under those standards are further described in the section below entitled "Responsibilities of the Controller and Auditor General for the Audit of the Financial Statements". I am independent of Tanzania Extractive Industries Transparency Initiative (TEITI) in accordance with the International Ethics Standards Board for Accountants Code of Ethics for Professional Accountants (IESBA Code) together with the National Board of Accountants and Auditors (NBAA) Code of Ethics, and I have fulfilled my other ethical responsibilities in accordance with these requirements.

I believe that the audit evidence I have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for my opinion.

Key Audit Matters

Key audit matters are those matters that, in my professional judgment, were of the most significance in my audit of the financial statements of the current period. I have determined that there are no key audit matters to communicate in my report.

Other Information

Management is responsible for the other information. The other information comprises the Permanent Secretary's Statement, statement of management responsibility, and the Declaration by the Head of Finance but does not include the financial statements and my audit report thereon which I obtained prior to the date of this auditor's report.

My opinion on the financial statements does not cover the other information, and I do not express any form of assurance conclusion thereon.

In connection with my audit of the financial statements, my responsibility is to read the other information and, in doing so, consider whether the other information is materially inconsistent with the financial statements, or my knowledge obtained in the audit, or otherwise appears to be materially misstated.

If, based on the work I have performed on the other information that I obtained prior to the date of this audit report, I conclude that there is a material misstatement of this other information, I am required to report that fact. I have nothing to report in this regard.

Responsibilities of Management and those charged with Governance for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in accordance with IPSAS and for such internal control as management determines is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, management is responsible for assessing the entity's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless management either intends to liquidate the entity or to cease operations or has no realistic alternative but to do so.

Those charged with governance are responsible for overseeing the entity's financial reporting process.

Responsibilities of the Controller and Auditor General for the Audit of the Financial Statements

My objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or

error and to issue an audit report that includes my opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with ISSAIs will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken based on these financial statements.

As part of an audit in accordance with ISSAIs, I exercise professional judgment and maintain professional skepticism throughout the audit. I also:

- Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error, design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks, and obtain audit evidence that is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for my opinion. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control;
- Obtain an understanding of internal control relevant to the audit in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control;
- Evaluate the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates and related disclosures made by management;
- Conclude on the appropriateness of management's use of the going concern basis of accounting and, based on the audit evidence obtained, whether a material uncertainty exists related to events or conditions that may cast significant doubt on the entity's ability to continue as a going concern. If I conclude that a material uncertainty exists, I am required to draw attention in my audit report to the related disclosures in the financial statements or, if such disclosures are inadequate, to modify my opinion. My conclusions are based on the audit evidence obtained up to the date of my audit report. However, future events or conditions may cause the entity to cease to continue as a going concern; and
- Evaluate the overall presentation, structure, and content of the financial statements, including the disclosures, and whether the financial statements represent the underlying transactions and events in a manner that achieves fair presentation.

I communicate with those charged with governance regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit and significant audit findings, including any significant deficiencies in internal control that I identify during my audit.

I also provide those charged with governance with a statement that I have complied with relevant ethical requirements regarding independence and to communicate with them all relationships and other matters that may reasonably be thought to bear on my independence, and where applicable, related safeguards.

From the matters communicated with those charged with governance, I determine those matters that were of most significance in the audit of the financial statements of the current period and are, therefore, key audit matters. I describe these matters in my audit report unless law or regulation precludes public disclosure about the matter or when, in extremely rare circumstances, I determine that a matter should not be communicated in my report because the adverse consequences of doing so would reasonably be expected to outweigh the public interest of such communication.

In addition, Section 10 (2) of the Public Audit Act, Cap 418 requires me to satisfy myself that the accounts have been prepared in accordance with the appropriate accounting standards.

Further, Section 48(3) of the Public Procurement Act, 2011 requires me to state in my annual audit report whether the audited entity has complied with the procedures prescribed in the Procurement Act and its Regulations.

1.2 REPORT ON COMPLIANCE WITH LEGISLATIONS

1.2.1 Compliance with the Public Procurement laws

Subject matter: Compliance audit on procurement of works, goods and services I performed a compliance audit on the procurement of works, goods and services in the Tanzania Extractive Industries Transparency Initiative (TEITI) for the financial year 2021/22 as per the Public Procurement laws.

STATEMENT BY PERMANENT SECRETARY FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE, 2022

The implementation of the Extractive Industries Transparency Initiative (EITI) continued in the Sixth Phase of Government that assumed office on 19 March 2021 when H.E Samia Suluhu Hassan was sworn and became the first female president in Tanzanian history. Since taking the office, the Government campaigned an agenda of sustaining the foundations set forth by the previous Regimes aiming at promoting good governance. The key priority of the sixth phase of Government includes maintaining national values of s peace, unity and solidarity which are the core values of the development of our nation; to continue with the implementation plan to improve the business environment by reviewing policies, laws and various regulations to attract private sector investment and increase employment opportunities; to improve resource mobilization, simplification of tax payments and widening the tax base; and to continue strengthening parastatal to operate profitably, pay dividends and appropriate contribution to the Government. The reforms implemented by the new Government give an impetus to the implementation of EITI in Tanzania.

The objective of TEITI is to strengthen and enhance transparency and accountability in the administration of Tanzania's extractive industries so that the exploitation of non-renewable and finite resources can stimulate growth and help to reduce poverty. TEITI objectives complement the Government's efforts to enhance governance of natural resources so that the exploitation of resources can stimulate growth and help to reduce poverty. The government is contributing to this cause by collaborating with extractive companies and civil society organizations to mainstream transparency and accountability into the Government's administration framework for extractive industries.

In the Fiscal year 2021/22, TEITI published its 12th report covering the period of 1 July 2019 to 30 June 2020. The disclosure of extractive industries payments and revenues through EITI has helped to improve revenue collection and accountability. This has resulted in creating public debates and discussions regarding the contribution of the mining, oil and gas sectors to the economy. It has also enabled citizens to have free access to information on the extractive industry, relatively more accessible than ever. Through a regular disclosure of payments and revenues to the government, TEITI builds trust and promotes stability and sustainable economic development.

However, the implementation of EITI in Tanzania is hindered by a lack of awareness of TEITI activities among the public caused by a large coverage area and significant gaps in terms of knowledge and understanding of mining, oil and gas-related activities. In the next financial years, TEITI will continue to create awareness through training and workshops as well as Television and radio programmes to various stakeholders to adequately manage the expected public expectations.

COMMENTARY TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE, 2022

1. Introduction

This part of the report describes comprehensively the information in regard to the financial results pertaining to the financial year 2021/22 for the Tanzania Extractive Industries Transparence Initiatives (TEITI). It provides overall picture of information on the financial and physical performance for the financial year 2021/22 in comparison with previous year (2020/21) as per IPSAS' requirements. There were some previous year's figures that have been restated.

2. Overview of Financial Statements

2.1 Revenue

2.1.1. Approved Estimate

During the year 2021/22, TEITI's approved recurrent expenditure budget was TZS 443,415,543 the same amount when compared to the approved recurrent budget of the prior year 2020/21.

2.1.2 Fund Received

During the financial year 2021/22, TEITI received recurrent fund TZS 410,159,377.00 issued by the Government being a decrease of 7.5% compared to the prior year 2020/21 TZS 449,517,143.00 was received.

2.2. Expenditure

The TEITI incurred various expenses in the financial year ended 30 June 2022. The expenditure was mainly charged in executing its activities as per the following categories;

2.2.1 Wages, salaries, and employee benefits

During the year 2021/22 Wages, salaries and employee benefits was TZS 185,560,000.00 being an increase of 61.27 percent when compared to TZS 115,054,800.00 of the financial year 2020/21 as detailed in NOTE 22.

2.2.2 Use of Goods and Services

During the year 2021/22 Supplies and consumables were TZS 528,334,246.00 being an increase of 42 percent when compared to TZS 371,087,401.00 of the financial year 2020/21 as detailed in NOTE 24. In the figure of Use of goods and Services 2021/22 included non-monetary expenditure TZS 319,346,874 and imprest retirement TZS 10,270,000 that make difference from the figure of Use of goods and services in the cash flow statement.

2.2.3 Maintenance expenses

The TEITI incurred a total of TZS 6,993,577.00 in maintenance expenses during the year ended 30 June 2022 being an increase of 251 percent when compared to TZS 1,850,000.00 of the financial year 2020/21 as detailed in **NOTE 25**. In the figure of

maintenance expenses 2021/22 included TZS 500,000 being retirement imprest that make difference in the figure of maintenance expenses presented in the cash flow.

2.3 Receivables

During the year 2021/22 there was no receivables compared to TZS 10,770,000.00 of the year 2020/21. This amount has been recognized in the books of accounts as detailed in **NOTE 33**.

2.4 Cash and Cash Equivalents

During the year 2021/22 Cash and Cash Equivalents was TZS 14,867,375.00 while the cash and cash equivalent for the prior year was TZS 20,266,832.64 a decrease of 26.64%. The analysis of which is detailed in **Note 32**. Cash and Cash equivalents is the cash at the BOT at the end of the financial year 2021/22.

2.5 Accounts Payables

During the year 2021/22 there were no account payables compared to the year 2020/21 the account payable was TZS 5,998,788.00 as shown in Note 39

2.6 Property, Plant and Equipment (PPE)

Plant, Property and Equipment during the year ended 30 June, 2022 amounting to TZS 86,789,918.94 being an increase of 49.5% when compared to TZS 58,056,001.44 of year 2020/21 as detailed in the schedule of PPE.

2.7 Contingent liabilities

There were no contingent liabilities arose from legal claims against TEITI for the year ending 30 June 2021.

2.8 Comparative figure

Financial statements of TEIT! have been prepared by using International Public Sector Accounting Standards (IPSAS), whereby previous year's financial statements are compared with current year's statements to determine the financial trends of the institution.

2.9 Other Expenses

The TEITI incurred a total of TZS 14,266,630.00 in other expenses during the year ended 30th June, 2022 being a decrease of 94 percent when compared to TZS. 109,897,100.00 of the financial year 2020/21 as detailed in NOTE 28. In the prior year components in NOTE 28 were presented in NOTE 24 (Use of goods and services).

3.0 Review of Asset Useful Life

As required by IPSAS 17, TEITI has reviewed the value of its assets by changing the estimated useful life basing on the conditions of a particular assets as guided by circular No.2 of 2021/22 for Government Assets Management Information System (GAMIS) to as to avoid having assets in operation that have zero carrying value.

3.1 Prior Year Adjustment

Reinstatement made to comparative figures for the previous year 2020/21 as per requirement of para 55 of IPSAS 1. Adjustment has been made to correct the treatment of the receivable and deferred income figure . The management of TEITI received an

approval of Development fund TZS 850,000,000 on 20 June 2020. The fund was treated as receivable incorrectly because TEITI was no longer expected to receive the fund to its books of account as the Ministry of Minerals sent the fund to Ministry's Deposit Account where TEITI Operate its activities thereon.

During the year 2020/21 the amount of TZS 142,419,200.00 was spent and recorded in the Cash flow statement as received and spent incorrectly.

2. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The principal accounting policies adopted in the preparation of these financial statements are set below. These policies have been consistently applied to all the years presented unless otherwise stated.

a) Basis of preparation

The financial statements for this year have been prepared on IPSAS Accrual Basis of accounting. The financial statements comprise the following;

- (a) Statement of financial position (statement I);
- (b) Statement of financial performance (statement II);
- (c) Statement of changes in net assets (statement III);
- (d) Statement of cash flows (using the indirect method) (statement IV);
- (e) Statement of comparison of budget and actual amounts (statement V);
- (f) Notes to the financial statements, comprising a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory notes.
- (g) Comparative information in respect of all amounts presented in the financial statements indicated in (a) to (e) above and, where relevant, comparative information for narrative and descriptive information presented in the notes to these financial statements.

A number of different measurement bases are employed to different degrees and in varying combinations in financial statements. They include the following:

- i) Historical cost. Assets are recorded at the amount of cash or cash equivalents paid or the fair value of the consideration given to acquire them at the time of their acquisition. Liabilities are recorded at the amount of proceeds received in exchange for the obligation, or in some circumstances (for example, income taxes), at the amounts of cash or cash equivalents expected to be paid to satisfy the liability in the normal course of business.
- ii) Current cost. Assets are carried at the amount of cash or cash equivalents that would have to be paid if the same or an equivalent asset was acquired currently. Liabilities are carried at the undiscounted amount of cash or cash equivalents that would be required to settle the obligation currently.
- iii) Realizable (settlement) value. Assets are carried at the amount of cash or cash equivalents that could currently be obtained by selling the asset in an orderly disposal. Liabilities are carried at their settlement values; that is, the undiscounted amounts of cash or cash equivalents expected to be paid to satisfy the liabilities in the normal course of business.
- iv) **Present value.** Assets are carried at the present discounted value of the future net cash inflows that the item is expected to generate in the normal course of business.

Liabilities are carried at the present discounted value of the future net cash outflows that are expected to be required to settle the liabilities in the normal course of business.

b) Comparatives

Where necessary, comparatives figures have been adjusted to conform to the changes in the current year. In particular, comparative figures have been adjusted for change in presentation to ensure compliance with International Standard.

c) Revenue Recognition

Revenue is recognized/ (recorded) when earned from Government.

d) Function and presentation currency

The reporting and presentation currency is Tanzanian shillings (TZS).

e) Property, Plant & Equipment

Depreciation is provided so as to allocate the cost of assets on a straight-line method over the expected useful lives of the concerned assets. The principal rates used for this purpose are:

Gains and Losses on disposal of assets are determined and included in the results for the year.

f) Going Concern

The accounts have been prepared on going concern basis on the assurance by the Project Management that they will continue to provide financial support for the foreseeable future.

g) Contingent Liabilities and Asset

There are no contingent Asset and liabilities during the year.

h) Date of authorization for issue

The financial statement is due for submission to the Controller and Auditor General (CAG) on or by 30 September 2022 and will be authorized for issue after being tabled on and discussed by the parliament on or by 31 March 2023.
